- Write a problem for an Agony Aunt section on a website.

Year 9

- Research the influences of rap in Spain (hip-hop) and Latin-American (less urban) and write your own rap song in Spanish.
- Choose fictional character (i.e.: Dracula) and pretend they have an every-day job.
 Design a comic book depicting their funny adventures in Spanish.
- Use the vocabulary learnt in class to create your own dance / fitness routine, record it and get everyone moving!
- Investigate Peruvian folk tales & write and illustrate a children's tale based on the results of your research.
- Create a virtual escape room (on PPT) to revise the grammar and vocabulary from the whole year.
